1	Describe the difference between a 'direct scar' and an 'indirect scar' on a horse and list two examples of each
2	Describe two visual clues to the presence of a direct scar on a horse:
3	The horse that you are going to treat is standing at the back of the stable, with its head on the floor. It looks miserable and you notice that there is a yellow discharge draining from its nostrils. What do you do ?
4	What is probably the most common incident for a horse that would leave it with emotional scars and what would characterise the scars ?
5	There is a lot in the horse press about the tightness of nosebands on the ridden horse. What kind of problem might this cause for the horse and what would be the give away clues when you assess the un-ridden horse?
6	What kind of scars might be associated with a horse that is bottom of the pecking order in a herd? Give examples of each.
7	List all the signals that would you look for in the horse that tells you whether they have had enough MSTR treatment or not ?
8	If it is safe for you and you are able to stand behind the horse and look along its spine, in general terms what would you be looking for and why?
9	What assessment tools should you use before treating the horse?
10	You have found what you believe to be a scar in the horse. What five things might you feel whilst you are palpating the area ?
11	List 10 calming signals that you would expect to see from the horse
12	What would you expect to feel under your fingertips and see when a scar is releasing?
13	List 10 conditions that respond very well to Equine MSTR:
14	Why would you ask the horse's owner to step away from the animal during treatment?
15	Why is it important to talk to the owner in front of the horse before treatment starts?
16	You have discovered a patch of fibrotic tissue that corresponds with a kick mark sustained in the field and on the right gluteal area. Describe what moves you would choose and how long you would work on the scar for.
17	Describe what moves you would use for fibrotic tissue in the hamstrings?
18	Describe when you would not attempt to use MSTR on a horse:
19	Describe the maximum treatment time for an Equine scar and explain what might happen if you exceed this time:
20	You are called to see a horse that is short and pottery in it's movement. The owner describes it as being about 5% lame. Describe how you would proceed and explain what you might find and how you would approach the treatment?
